

# How it all began

In 1995, God touched my heart at a meeting in Eastmanville, Michigan where they were talking about opportunities for individuals with disabilities. Scott and I thought we would attend to see what was available for our son. We didn't realize the meeting was about housing opportunities.

Our son, Tyler, was 13 at the time. We always thought we would be the ones to care for him, so this meeting didn't seem like it was for us.

We were surprised to hear that there was little or no option for long-term care for those with severe, multiple impairments. Many families left that night feeling very disappointed because they needed a place —and they needed it yesterday. My heart was so heavy that it ached for them.

Little did I know that this meeting in 1995 was the start of Gods' wonderful plan.

The Holy Spirit was prompting me. After many months of being bothered by this, I went to Holland to visit two care facilities—My Brother's House and My Sister's House—where I talked to various people who were doing this work. They affirmed the need.

In 1997, I was talking to Diane VanderWest who pointed me to Chuck Schipper. She said that he had a daughter who went to Ottawa Access Center (OAC). He was also the president of Oakcrest Manors (a nursing care facility). Perhaps he would know something about starting up a home that would provide long-term care for those with disabilities.

I wrestled with contacting him until 1999. I called Chuck. At first, he wasn't going to take my call. He didn't know me. When his secretary told him I had a son at OAC he took the call. A week later, Chuck and Kathy, came to our house. We talked about our families and what God had laid on our hearts. They were on board!

In January of 2000—five years after God touched my heart—we held our first meeting in our living room with some family and friends. We hoped to share our vision and come up with a name. Since our previous church (Fair Haven) wasn't using the name Harbor House for their old youth building anymore, they let us use it. Harbor—a safe place. Harbor House—a refuge for individuals with severe disabilities.

### Built over time

2000 – Families come together to develop a vision where individuals with profound disabilities could receive care and be actively involved in their community.

2001 - A plan began to build three homes debt-free and land is secured.

2003 - Ground is broken on 44th street for the first home.

2004 - Pier Place opens and 12 people moved in to their new home.

2006 – Beacon Place is built and becomes home to 12 more people.

2008 - Anchor Place is completed and 12 more people join the Harbor House family.

2010 - The Cove is built to offer therapies and activities outside of the homes.

2011 - Random Acts of Kindness begin in service of our community.

2014 - Harbor House begins advocacy efforts to support a wide array of housing and care options for people with developmental disabilities.

Over time, Harbor House has developed multiple community programs and collaborated with community partners to enhance the options and opportunities available for adults with developmental disabilities.

To date, Harbor House has served over 60 individuals and their their families, has been staffed by over 1000 dedicated and gifted individuals, has mentored the development of several other organizations, and is supported by a community that cares.









#### Think Bigger

One of my earliest memories of HHM goes back to before we even opened our first building. A group of parents and Board members had been meeting for about a year and had decided we wanted to find land to build a six bed home.

As we went down this path we eventually faced some unexpected obstacles which resulted in missing out on what we thought was the ideal property.

Once this door was closed, another one opened that would involve the eventual construction of homes for 36 individuals.

This taught us early on to "think bigger" and trust God to bless this ministry. This trust has been the foundation for the success of HHM for these twenty years of operation.

#### God's timing

Allison was the second person to move into Harbor House. Tyler came in the morning and Allison joined in the afternoon. Probably enough for the first day.

God's timing on this major change in our lives was truly amazing. Allison was 25 and had been living with us at home all those years. She was severely, multiply impaired so her care was much like that of an infant.

At age 24 a serious medical complication occurred. Without going into too much detail, this very quickly became an unsustainable care situation for our family. With help from friends, neighbors, and church as well as excellent medical support we were able to get her mostly stabilized.

At about the same time we heard of the progress in the development of Harbor House. Mary was invited to a Mom's lunch at Ottawa Area Center and decided to go even though Allison was still having difficulties. She sat next to Joy and learned that Harbor House would soon be taking applications.

We applied, were interviewed and accepted by Harbor House. We were excited and, along with the other parents of the residents, got involved in cleaning up after the construction folks and preparing the assigned rooms for our children. We were allowed to decorate and furnish the rooms to fit our tastes and the needs of our children. It was an exciting time for the staff, parents, and everyone involved.

We visited often. It was difficult to give up Allison's care when she had been such a major factor in our lives. When we went to visit Allison, we really were just mostly hanging out with the staff. We got to know them, they got to know us, and we could help them learn about Allison's unique behaviors. We could also share Mary's chocolate chip cookies which seemed to disappear quickly.

When Allison developed other complications, the HHM staff was amazing. They came alone or in small groups as their shifts allowed and visited in a continuous chain. After awhile, the security guards just assumed it was another visitor for Allison. They shared many wonderful words about how much they loved her. This was what made Harbor House so special to us.

#### After us

Still clear in my mind 43 years later is the birth of our daughter Tara. During the two weeks she spent in NICU the news from the doctors was grim. We were told she would be profoundly cognitively and physically disabled. She would never walk, nor talk, nor learn. To make thing's worse, she had frequent grand mal seizures. We were a young couple, and the implications of Tara's injury rocked us.

Happily she somewhat exceeded the doctor's predictions. Looking back, Tara's life has, in many ways, been a blessing in ours. We enjoy and love her!

From the beginning, the thought crept into the back of our minds, "What happens to Tara AFTER US?" The big AFTER US got louder and louder and filled our conversations and prayers. Our inevitable aging and health issues were taking a toll. We did our homework and were bold. As the years then decades went by, we were floundering in finding a place for Tara. The bottom line was, would we ever let our sweet Tara be in someone else's hands?

As our retirement loomed in 2017, Tara's Uncle Joe gave us a call and said, "Check out this place—Harbor House Ministries—for the developmentally disabled." When we were given a tour, we were impressed with the warmth and friendly greetings of the HHM staff. I was particularly impressed with the Christian moorings and mission, stability of core staff, and how administrative offices were located and divided between each of the three homes—intimate to the residents and not blocks or miles away. Also, Tara always loved the water and her dad was elated to see the residents swimming pool in the Cove. We learned of Harbor House's busy activity life and regular outings for the residents.

We were sold on Harbor House and filled out an application for Tara. We knew that openings among Harbor House's 36 slots were rare.

Unexpectedly, November 2023 we got a call from Tara's case manager, Alanna. She said, "Are you sitting down? There is an opening at Harbor House, and an invitation is being extended to Tara." I turned and shared the information with Tara's dad, John, and we both immediately started crying with our faces on the kitchen table. The floodgates opened with a mixture of relief and sadness at the prospect of Tara leaving.

Tara moved into her new home at Harbor House on Valentine's Day 2023. The month prior we decorated Tara's newly painted room, brought furniture and arranged her room just so. The activity was cathartic for us.

There has been a learning curve for us, and perhaps for staff as they've taken care of Tara. We have suffered with a lot of empty nest syndrome at home as we find our new normal. During those early months we saw distress on Tara's face when we would leave her after a visit. But a year later when we leave, she very quickly relaxes and seems at home with her new family and routines.

As we roll into our 70s, we have no regrets for Tara and think we've safely found Tara's AFTER US at Harbor House. She is truly home!

#### Power in prayer

In each breakroom on campus, there are prayer boxes with request slips. Staff or family members can fill out a slip and drop it in the box. Once a week, a member of the prayer team checks the boxes for the written requests. At times, we may notice something off with a staff member and stop to chat and offer prayer.

The prayer notebook is full of pages with categories like pregnancies, mental and emotional health, alcoholism, cancer, praises, illness and more. The team has supported people in gut wrenching situations. There are some who no longer work at HHM that still connect with the team for prayer.

That prayer book is also filled with improbable outcomes.

A former employee's husband had cancer. He went through radiation and chemo and almost had a feeding tube. He lost a lot of weight. It was awful. We were updated around 2 times a month on his condition, and we faithfully prayed accordingly. Now, he is cancer free and doing really well.

We prayed for an employee's son and his wife to be able to conceive. We prayed for several years. They had a beautiful and healthy baby.

We have prayed for the husband of one of our employees and the son of an employee both struggling with alcohol. Both families on the verge of breaking apart. Now, both are under control, and we continue to pray for their health and to stay strong.

We have prayed for two employees regarding their sons that needed to graduate. Through different routes, they each received their diplomas.

We have prayed over a couple of employees struggling to deal with anxiety and depression. Although we pray over many of these situations, these two were very vulnerable and open. Counseling was sought and had favorable outcomes. We are still praying as their pursuit for wholeness continues.


